To mark the completion of the nursery extension, cutting the ribbon was Councillor Alan Barry, Chairman of Cumbria County Council, lead architect (and former pupil) Raymond Whittaker, and Headteacher, Graham Frost.

Making the event more memorable and appealing for our youngest pupils, we were privileged to be joined by Peppa Pig who inevitably stole the show!



After the ribbon cutting, there was tea and a celebration cake for dignitaries including former members of staff, the construction workers, the Friends of Robert Ferguson Primary School and School Governors. Councillor Alan Barry said: "The revamped Robert Ferguson Primary looks fantastic and I'm sure pupils and staff are really going to feel the benefits of their new surroundings. "The Transforming Learning project highlights the council's commitment to delivering the best education facilities possible and I'm delighted to see the scheme coming to fruition."

Raymond Whittaker said: "As a former pupil it's been a real honour to play a role in transforming my old school and to be asked to take part in the ribbon-cutting to mark completion of the project."

This is exactly the kind of nursery facility Robert Ferguson Primary School has been desperate for. At their last visit Ofsted said that for us to be outstanding, the outdoor early years provision had to be as good as the excellent indoor provision. Well now it is - with many fantastic additions to what we can provide throughout.



Expanding the school will ultimately boost its capacity by 105 with the reception in-take already having increased from 45 to 60.

Sports Relief
